## Capital letters

Always begin a new sentence with a capital letter.
Names of people, places, and countries start with a capital letter.
Example: In America and in Canada, we write letters to John.
Do not write: "in america and canada, we write letters to john."
Oh boy! That last sentence has no capital letters. Oops!

Here is another sentence:

He writes a letter to an American and a Canadian.
Why is "an" in front of "American" and not in front of "Canadian"?
Because the word "American" starts with a vowel and
the word "Canadian" starts with a consonant.

## an

When a word starts with a vowel, then instead of putting an " $a$ " in front of it you put "an."

Here are some words that begin with a vowel. Can you make a sentence with some of these words in it?

## ed

To mark the past, most verbs (action words) have "ed" added at the end. Examples: talk $\rightarrow$ talked, walk $\rightarrow$ walked, move $\rightarrow$ moved

But some words do not follow this rule. Examples:
know $\rightarrow$ knew - write $\rightarrow$ wrote - see $\rightarrow$ saw - do $\rightarrow$ did -
read $\rightarrow$ read - stand $\rightarrow$ stood - tell $\rightarrow$ told - sell $\rightarrow$ sold think $\rightarrow$ thought - bring $\rightarrow$ brought - buy $\rightarrow$ bought -
go $\rightarrow$ went - catch $\rightarrow$ caught - teach $\rightarrow$ taught -
eat $\rightarrow$ ate - stand $\rightarrow$ stood - find $\rightarrow$ found - is $\rightarrow$ was

## silent "k" and "gh"

Some words begin with " $k$ " but you don't hear " $k$."
Examples: knight - knife - I know - I knew - knack - knock knob - knot - knee

Some words have " $g h$ " in it, but you don't hear that " $g h$ "
Examples: light - night - sight - bright - fright - height - tight
